Exploring cultural heritage: walk trails featuring ancient Aboriginal art

Nganjarli Trail

Discover the Nganjarli Trail featuring ancient Aboriginal artwork in Murujuga National Park. This accessible trail has concrete paths, steel ramps and walkways for you to safely see unique rock engravings or petroglyphs created more than 45,000 years ago. The best time to view them is early in the day or late afternoon when the sun is lower, casting shadows and making the petroglyphs more prominent.

With more than one million images, this is the largest, densest, and most diverse collection of rock art in the world and well-worth a visit.

Yoornging Geranyem Banan Trail

Explore the secrets of Mirima National Park. Just outside of Kununurra, this spectacular park features a walk trail called the Yoornging Geranyem Banan Trail (Painting on Rocks Trail) - a 3.5km loop which will lead you to discover ancient Aboriginal rock art. The towering rocky domes of the Bungle Bungle Range in [Purnululu National Park](#) have enchanted people with their majestic beauty for tens of thousands of years. The Gija, Jaru and Malngin people are the Traditional Owners of this land and have an enduring cultural connection spanning more than 20,000 years. We are calling on all wildflower enthusiasts, bushwalkers, mountain bikers, birdwatchers and travellers to look for and report plants with signs of myrtle rust and to take precautions when travelling in and out of northern WA to reduce the spread.

Cane toads – invasive species threat

Introduced to Australia in 1935, cane toads quickly became a problem, outcompeting native species for food and habitat. They also pose a risk for wildlife that prey on them, including pets. Cane toads are excellent hitchhikers so please take care when packing up in campgrounds to ensure you don't take a toad down the road.

If you're traveling with your furry friend, it's crucial to protect them from cane toads. Poisoning is rare but know the symptoms and first aid measures.
