John Forrest National Park, WA's first and oldest national park, has had a series of fantastic upgrades to enhance your outdoor experience.

- Noolbenger Trail: A 16km off-road trail, perfect for cyclists and trail runners.
- Little Eagle Trail: An 8km loop trail that promises stunning views.
- Upgraded trails: The Eagle View, Wildflower, and Glen Brook trails have all received improvements.

There are also new landscaped gardens, accessible picnic and barbecue areas. Come and spend a day exploring <u>John Forrest National Park</u>.

Keep cool on this trail

Calling all divers and snorkellers! As the weather warms up, cool off at the MAAC dive and snorkel trail in Marmion Marine Park.

The trail is about 400m long and ranges in depth from 2 - 6m with 20 underwater plinths to guide your way. The plinths are printed with fun activities, information and directions.

The MAAC Dive and Snorkel Trail (Marmion Angling and Aquatic Club) can be found in Marmion Marine Park between Trigg Island and Burns Beach.






